Registration FAQs

Who can register and vote in Minnesota?

You must be:

- A U.S. citizen
- At least 18 years old on Election Day
- A resident of Minnesota for 20 days

Finished with [all parts of any felony sentence](#)

You can vote while under guardianship unless a judge specifically has revoked your right to vote.

You cannot vote if a court has ruled that you are legally incompetent.



Do I have to register if I move or change names? You must re-register each time you change address, change names or do not vote at least once during a four-year period. Update your registration by completing a new registration application.

Is there a registration deadline? Unlike many states, you can wait until Election Day to register in Minnesota. However, we encourage you to register before Election Day—it will save you time at the polling place.

The deadline to [register online](#) is 11:59 p.m., 21 days before Election Day.

The deadline to [register on paper](#) is 5 p.m., 21 days before Election Day.

Otherwise, you can [register on Election Day](#) at your polling place.

Can I register when I renew my driver's license or state ID? You can register to vote by checking a box on your driver's license or state ID application or renewal form.

Can I register when I change addresses with U.S. Postal Service? If you move to a new Minnesota residence, you can submit a United States Postal Service (USPS) change-of-address form. USPS will notify election officials of the change. If election officials can match the record in their system, they will update your address and mail a green confirmation postcard to you.

Do I have to choose a political party when I register? Minnesota does not have political party registration. Voters are not asked to publicly declare affiliation with a political party.

Where can I get proof of registration? Proof of registration can be obtained from your county election office.

My registration has a typo—what do I do? If you note a typo in your name on the confirmation postcard you receive after registering, contact your county election office.

SOME FUN VOTING FACTS:

- ◆ The tallest U.S. President was Abraham Lincoln at 6'4". The shortest U.S. President was James Madison at 5'4".
- ◆ Percent wise – the 1992 election was the biggest turnout since 1972 with 61.3 percent off the voter age population heading to the polls.

Minnesotans can vote absentee by mail and in-person starting September 23

Secretary of State Steve Simon is reminding Minnesotans that Friday, September 23—eligible voters can begin casting their ballots early for the November 8 General Election by voting absentee. This is the first presidential-election year where Minnesotans no longer need an excuse to vote absentee—a reform also known as no-excuses absentee voting. Minnesotans can request an absentee ballot to be mailed to them, or they can vote absentee in-person at their county or local elections office.

“I encourage all eligible Minnesotans who can’t make it to the polls on Election Day, or simply want to vote from the comfort of their own home, to vote early by casting an absentee ballot and ensure that their voice is heard,” said Secretary Simon. ***“I know that together we can get our state back to number one in voter turnout in the country.”***

For nine elections in a row Minnesota was number one in the country in voter turnout. In 2014, Minnesota fell to number six. Secretary Simon is challenging the people of Minnesota and the thousands of nonprofits and businesses across the state to return our state back to number one.

HOW TO REQUEST AN ABSENTEE BALLOT

Minnesota voters can request an absentee ballot quickly and easily at www.mnvotes.org using the online application. Voters can also request an absentee ballot by downloading the “2016 Minnesota Absentee Ballot Application” and returning it to their county election office by email, mail, or fax. Absentee Ballot application forms are available in English, Spanish, Hmong, Somali, Vietnamese, Karen, Russian, Chinese, Lao, Oromo, Khmer, and Amharic.

Voters can request an absentee ballot even if they are not registered to vote — a voter registration application will be provided with their ballot.

IMPORTANT DEADLINES

Voting Absentee by Mail: Minnesotans voting absentee by mail must make sure their ballot is returned on or before the November 8 General Election. Ballots returned after November 8 will not be counted.

Voting Absentee In-Person: The last day to vote absentee in-person is Monday, November 7.

MILITARY AND OVERSEAS VOTERS

Minnesotans serving in the military or living abroad—temporarily or indefinitely—can have an absentee ballot sent to them anywhere in the world. Learn more here: <http://bit.ly/1Yybb1v>.

WHAT’S ON MY BALLOT?

In addition to voting for the next President of the United States, Minnesotans will vote for their member of the U.S. House of Representatives, their state Senator and Representative, as well as on a constitutional amendment. Some Minnesotans may also be voting for their local County Commissioner, Soil & Water Supervisor, City Officers, School Board Members, Township Officers, or local ballot questions.

Minnesotans can use “My Ballot” to view their sample ballot and find links to candidates’ websites.

TRACKING YOUR BALLOT

Beginning September 23, upon requesting an absentee ballot, voters may check the status of their ballot, such as when it was mailed, and if their completed ballot was received and accepted by their local elections office.

Go to www.sos.state.mn.us for all the information on voting. **Remember: Don’t ask “who did you vote for?” but rather, “did you vote?”**




Unintended Consequences of Re-Insulating a Home

Re-insulating an existing home *properly* is a complicated task. A house is a system; a bunch of smaller parts that make up systems, that make up larger systems. The tighter the house, the more a house tends to behave like a system. This means that when you change something in the house, such as adding more insulation, that change can affect the home's performance. In most cases, this is the intended outcome.

If insulation and air sealing is performed in an attic, it might make the rooms below feel warmer, reduce heating costs during the winter, and help to prevent snow from melting on the roof, in turn eliminating ice dams. That's great, but *what else changed that wasn't supposed to?* Here's a list of possible unintended consequences.



Back Drafting

When air is pulled out of a house, the house will draw outside air back into the house. The amount of air coming in equals the amount of air being pulled out. Simple. This exchange of air happens when you run your bath fans, range hood, or clothes dryer. Depressurization occurs when there is more air leaving the house than coming in. Depressurization can cause a handful of problems, but I will focus on back drafting.

Back drafting occurs when a combustion appliance, such as a water heater, can't generate enough draft to vent the combustion gases up the flue. When back drafting happens, these gases spill into the house, causing a potential buildup of carbon monoxide. Unintentional carbon monoxide exposure accounts for an estimated 15,000 emergency department visits and 500 unintentional deaths in the United States each year. (Source: <http://www.cdc.gov/mmwr/preview/mmwrhtml/mm5650a1.htm>).

While the Minnesota Fuel Gas Code has specific installation requirements for gas water heaters, just following all of these rules doesn't mean a water heater will draft properly. Even with a proper installation, there are three common home improvements that can cause problems with existing water heaters.

Tightening the enclosure. This is done by air sealing gaps or cracks in the exterior of the house, adding insulation or weather stripping, and replacing windows or siding.

Adding ventilation appliances such as bath fans, larger cooktop vent hoods or whole house ventilation fans.

Replacing the furnace. When older furnaces are replaced with newer sealed combustion units, the water heater vent often becomes "orphaned". It used to share a large flue with the old furnace, but now it's left to fend for itself to produce a draft. The relatively small burner on a water heater doesn't always produce enough draft to work properly by itself, so it back drafts.

Back drafting can be prevented by not having open combustion appliances - this often means replacing the old natural draft water heater with a power vent water heater. Performing a worst case depressurization test can determine if back drafting is occurring already, and can help predict if it will occur when the home is made tighter.

Condensation Problems

I often hear people say "...they build houses too tight. You gotta let them breathe." A leaky house may be uncomfortable and may have high utility bills, but is always well ventilated. This is why most 100 year old homes don't have mold or moisture problems. They "breathe". When houses are made tighter, they need to breathe through an intentional hole at a controlled rate. We have to pay close attention to this as we go into a house to perform air sealing measures or add insulation. These changes can tighten the house, effectively eliminating a source of ventilation. These changes in ventilation rates can have undesirable consequences such as elevated moisture levels in the house, condensation on windows, or mold growth.


Any of the changes made to a house that can cause depressurization can also change the ventilation rate. Another common ventilation change that isn't so obvious happens when old furnaces are replaced with new high efficiency furnaces. The older units produced a draft that pulled air from the house up the flue, providing a source of ventilation. Replace the old furnace... take away the source of ventilation.

Every house has its own prescribed ventilation requirement. This can be calculated along with a blower door test to determine if the house is "breathing" properly. The fix most commonly consists of adding new ventilation equipment that can be programmed to ventilate the correct amount of air.

Increased Radon Levels

Radon is a naturally occurring radioactive gas that is present in soil. It is odorless, colorless, and tasteless. Radon is the second leading cause of lung cancer and is responsible for an estimated 21,000 deaths per year. Radon is literally drawn up into the house by a form of depressurization called stack effect.

Houses that are leaky and have low levels of radon will often see an increase in radon levels after the building enclosure is tightened. This is due to a change in the natural air change rate, which dilutes radon levels. Once this source of ventilation is removed, radon levels increase. Any change to the natural ventilation rate in a house can cause a change in the radon levels.



What To Do

To minimize the potential for unintended consequences when adding insulation to a home and making it tighter, the first step should be to have a home diagnostic test performed. I'm not talking about the energy audits where you get a low-flow aerator for your sink, a tube of caulk, and a few CFL light bulbs. I'm talking about a comprehensive set of tests that includes the use of a blower door, an infrared scan, testing of the exhaust fans, and possibly even a radon test.

The benefit of having a diagnostic test is:

1. Thoroughly understanding the opportunities to improve the performance of your house
2. An accurate scope of work designed to have intended results
3. Testing after the work is done can measure if the work was done correctly
4. Unintended consequences can be identified before they become problems

For the best possible results on your next insulation project, be sure to work with a company that takes a holistic approach to your home envelope, and guarantees the results, not just the work.

How the *Lockboxes for Residents* program works

The Milaca Police Department provides lock boxes similar to those used by real estate agents to hold a spare house key. The lock box hangs securely over the neck of a doorknob or in an alternate location outside the home. The presence of a lock box does not interfere with the normal use of the door or the lock.

Your address and the lock box combination are stored within a secure police records management system. If police, ambulance, or fire personnel are summoned to your home due to a concern about your well-being the combination will be given to the rescue personnel only if no one answers the locked door.

The Milaca Police Department's residential lockbox program is designed to expedite access to senior adults and others with medical needs in their own homes during medicals or other emergencies. The lockbox program also reduces the likelihood of property damaged caused by first responders forcing entry into a home in response to an emergency call.

The lockbox program is open to all Milaca residents who:

- ◆ Are age 65 and above or
- ◆ Are under 65, with a major medical issue that could render them incapacitated or unconscious

Program Requirements

To be eligible, you must:

- ◆ Live in a private home or apartment
- ◆ Reside within the City of Milaca

- ◆ Have permission from the owner if you rent the home
- ◆ Provide a spare house key(s)
- ◆ Sign a release and agree to return the lock box if you no longer wish to participate in the program or sell the home
- ◆ Submit \$15.00 one-time enrollment fee
- ◆ Age 65 or under 65 but possess other major medical issues

How Does the Program Work?


1. The eligible participant will complete and submit a *Lockboxes for Residents* application to the Milaca Police Department. Applications can be picked up and dropped off at the front desk of the Police Department.
2. Once the application is approved and enrollment fee received, a Milaca Police Officer will contact the participant at their home to review the program.
3. The participant will provide a spare house key to the officer at which time the officer will place the key inside the lockbox and set the combination.
4. The officer will determine the best location for the lockbox that allows quick access for emergency responders.
5. The lockbox will only be used during an emergency call, and when responders can't make entry without using force. At no other time will the lockbox be used or will entry be made without authorization.
6. A participant may withdraw from the Lockboxes for Residents Program at any time by contacting the Milaca Police Department. After the key is returned to the participant, the empty lockbox will be removed from the residence and returned to the Police Department.

COMMERCIAL DRIVERS LICENSES

Effective July 1, 2015, all drivers renewing their Commercial Drivers License (CDL) will be required to provide a document from the following list that meets the proof of citizenship requirement:

- ◆ Valid, unexpired U.S. passport or passport card
- ◆ Certified copy of birth certificate from any U.S. state
- ◆ Consular report of birth abroad issued by the U.S. Department or state
- ◆ Certificate of Naturalization or Certificate of Citizenship issued by U.S. Department of Homeland Security
- ◆ Valid unexpired Permanent Resident Card OR
- ◆ Unexpired employment authorization document issued by USCIS or an unexpired foreign passport accompanied by an approved I-94 form.



If the name on the above document is different from the current name on the CDL, the customer must also present proof of the legal name change(s). Acceptable proof consists of certified marriage certificates, certified divorce decrees or other certified court orders. Divorce decrees or other court orders must specify the name change. Identity and name change documents need to show a clear link between the citizenship or permanent residency document and the current name.

This federally mandated requirement for DVS to record this information to the record is a **one-time occurrence**.

RENEWING YOUR VEHICLE TABS?

Per the Mn Department of Public Safety:
169.798 RULES OF COMMISSIONER OF PUBLIC SAFETY.

§Subd. 4. **Insurance information required.**

Every owner, when applying for motor vehicle or motorcycle registration,

reregistration, or transfer of ownership, must provide information showing that the motor vehicle or motorcycle is covered by an insurance policy. Information required under this subdivision consists of the insurance company's name,

the policy number, and the policy expiration date for the subject motor vehicle or motorcycle.

YOU DO NOT NEED TO BRING IN PROOF OF INSURANCE BUT BE SURE TO WRITE YOUR INSURANCE INFORMATION ON YOUR RENEWAL FORM

Bottom line: Provide insurance information when renewing your vehicle tabs.


CITY HALL TO KEEP SUMMER HOURS

GORECKI COMMUNITY CENTER RENTAL

Seems like just yesterday when reservations were being booked for rentals for the shelters in our parks.

Now here we are thinking about closing the restrooms because of the cooler weather arriving soon.

Did you know that we will be renting out space in the new Gorecki Community Center adjacent to the Splash Pad year round?

That's right. Because this building is heated, the restrooms will remain open for your rental of the building.

If you are a resident in the City of Milaca, rental for this building would be \$40.00 for up to 4 hours. More than 4 hours rental would be \$80.00. If you do not live within the city limits, rental for up to 4 hours

would be \$50.00 and over 4 hours rental would be \$100.00.

There is also a deposit of \$150.00 that needs to be paid when keys to the building are picked up the day of your reservation.



There are currently 6—6 foot tables and 40 chairs available for use.

City Hall will start taking shelter reservations after the first of the year.

Also, shelters may be reserved from May 1– September 30. After that date, restrooms will start to be winterized so there is no guarantee that they will be open after September 30.



Solving ice dams

Although sometimes thought of as a problem with roofing or attic ventilation, ice dams are *actually* caused by the presence of warm air in the attic, combined with snow on the roof and the right weather conditions. When heat leaks into the attic it melts the underside of the snow on the roof, which then flows down the roof surface until it reaches a cold spot (such as the eaves or soffit) where it forms a frozen dam. The ice build-up can back up under the shingles, damaging them and allowing water to leak to the ceilings and walls below.



The source of ice dams: attic air leaks



Warm air leaking from the house into the attic is the primary cause of ice dams. Anywhere there is a penetration into the attic space (around wires, plumbing vents, light fixtures, chimneys, knee walls) there is the potential for air leaks. Even homes that are only a few years old may not be properly sealed. To avoid these types of problems and eliminate most ice dams, attic air leaks *must* be sealed with caulking or expanding spray foam. Inadequate insulation, especially near the eaves, is also a contributing cause of ice dams.

Solutions

- Sealing attic air leaks saves energy and is **key to preventing ice dams**.
- An energy audit with an **infrared scan** can pinpoint trouble spots.
- If snow and ice must be removed, hiring **licensed contractors** that use steamers is strongly recommended.

What NOT to do:

- Installing heating cables **will shorten the life of your roof** and cost you money to operate.
- Removing ice with shovels, chippers, chemicals, or heat can **damage** shingles, gutters, and other building components—and can be dangerous.
- Adding roof vents—including powered vents—**will not eliminate** ice dams, and often makes the problems worse.
- Additional insulation—especially on the top plate of exterior walls—can reduce heat transfer to the roof deck, but **insulation alone is insufficient**. Typical attic insulation will not stop air leaks or prevent ice dams.
